





Much like International ACAC, the NACAC Board of Directors and CEO Angel Pérez keep working to elevate the profession, inspired by the vision that the transformative power of postsecondary education is accessible to all. Key highlights from the past year include:

- Elevating Equity in the admission process—In February 2023, NACAC convened teams of institutional leaders from colleges and universities to develop an evaluation framework that institutions can implement to examine and change practices that create barriers to entry to postsecondary education for traditional-aged and adult students of color, particularly Black students.
- Preparation for Supreme Court response—NACAC is working behind the scenes with our policy/advocacy partners, Ed Counsel, to develop a robust portfolio of materials, resources, and communications regarding the Supreme Court decision on race-conscious admissions. PRAYER/MEDITATION/QUIET ROOM Graham Center (GC) 316


This room, located on the third floor of the Graham Center, offers attendees a peaceful place to pray, meditate, or just sit away from the conference crowd.

Tony Succar is a two-time Latin Grammy award-winning artist, producer, and composer/arranger whose talents stem from a passion for music gifted to him early on in life. Born in Lima, Peru and raised in Miami, Florida, Succar is grateful to have come from a family of musicians. That early musical influence is his foundation and set the groundwork for what was to come. "I was privileged to be brought up in a family of musicians; I couldn't be more grateful," Succar explained. His gratitude goes beyond those in his family who have supported and encouraged him; it extends to his fans, fellow musicians, teachers, and other musical influences.

Tony's path has led him into the world of salsa, jazz, pop, and Afro-Latino-inspired music. He possesses a rare combination of high standards, a devotion to music, and a reverent respect for those who came before him. His formal musical education began on piano and then segued to percussion. He earned his Bachelor of Arts degree in Jazz Performance from Florida International University in 2008 and his Master's degree in 2010. It was FIU that fulfilled Tony's personal desire to surround himself in an environment that quenched his thirst for excellence.

In 2018, Tony was nominated for the prestigious Latin Grammy Awards for Best Tropical Song, "Me Enamoro Mas De Ti." He received four nominations in 2019 for Album of the Year, Best Tropical Song, Best Salsa Album, and Producer of the Year for his most recent album, Mas de Mi. Tony took home two Latin Grammys for Producer of the Year and Best Salsa Album, making history as the youngest winner to ever win both categories.

David Kimeli Bett is the lead college counselor of Tujenge Scholars Program (TSP) in Burundi. The first of its kind, TSP is an intensive preparatory program designed to equip the next generation of Burundian leaders with the connections and skills they need to move the country forward. In teaching fundamental courses, focusing on leadership development, and offering individualized counseling, TSP has become an essential launching point for incredible change-makers in East Africa. In just six years of operation. 61 of TSP's alumni have received fully funded scholarships to study in universities across North America and Africa.




Tchio Levis Suh Abongnwi is a passionate educator who serves as a high school counselor at Mada International



TAMARA LAPMAN

In December of 2022, the international education world lost one of the greats, Tamara Lapman. Tamara was a seasoned admission officer, widely known and recognized for the impactful work she did for nearly 20 years in the field of international admission. A dedicated admission professional since 2005, Tamara worked at Arcadia University, Bryn Mawr College, University of Richmond, and most recently at the University of Miami, where she was the Director of International and Transfer Admission. Tamara was a bright light who loved nothing more than traveling the world, advocating for students, and playing with her dog, Frank.

Tamara's work was her life calling, and she made a difference in the lives of thousands of prospective and current students at each of the institutions she served. From India to Jordan, Romania to Rwanda, Azerbaijan to Vietnam, this was her passion -- to provide opportunities to those who wouldn't otherwise have it. Many of the students whose lives she has touched have reflected on her impact, with one writing, "Tamara is one of the sweetest, kindest, and most beautiful human beings that I have known. She changed my life. She spent hours reading my application, asking questions about me so she could advocate for [me]."

Tamara's work made US higher education possible for international students with dreams as wide-ranging as the countries that issued their passports. Had her life not tragically been cut short in an act of domestic violence, many thousands more would have benefitted from her wonderful soul. Panetha Nychis Ott served as the Director of Admission, International Recruitment at Brown University in Rhode Island. Panetha had been a member of our organization since the early 90s. Founding members of International ACAC have said that the support from Panetha as such a well-respected colleague was integral in establishing the legitimacy of a young organization.

Panetha began her career at Brown in 1989, and worked for over 33 years recruiting international students to College Hill. Those that knew Panetha remember her as a champion for international students and secondary school counselors in the regions she visited and supported. Following 9/11, Panetha worked with NACAC to form an ad-hoc committee for the ethical treatment of international students. She was also hired by the U.S. State Department as a "circuit rider", traveling around the world to international schools promoting higher education.

Panetha was also one of the creators of the first Regional Institute in China in 2015. She helped to develop and shape the curriculum, and immediately supported the work of the organization.

The International ACAC community has lost a friend, a colleague, and a warrior – Panetha never stopped fighting for opportunities for talented students from around the world. She enjoyed traveling and sharing her extensive knowledge, and was up at all hours, answering emails from students and counselors in various time zones.

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

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
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
